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### PRINCIPAL



While last year, being my first year as Principal of our school, was one that I characterised by change, new beginnings and reflection, this year will be remembered as a time in which we defined, as a community, what highly effective teaching and learning looks like and embedded a culture of engagement and connection for all our learners. In the staff, I have witnessed a renewed focus on providing high quality teaching and, collectively, we have created a professional learning community focused on ongoing improvement. We are committed to providing the best education for every one of our students.

School improvement has moved well and truly into the classroom with the implementation of Learning By Design, our evidence based pedagogical approach. 2024 also saw the introduction of a genuine Professional Learning Communities culture, where teachers met weekly in teams to identify an improvement focus, research and experiment with High Impact Teaching strategies and to trial and evaluate new approaches. Feedback from all staff has been extremely positive with many teachers able to identify a direct impact of this work on improving student learning in the classroom. The inclusion of peer observations provided targeted feedback to teachers and leaders.

The introduction of a school-wide Moderation of Student Learning approach has ensured greater alignment of teacher judgement, a deeper understanding of the needs of each learner and has improved our assessment design.

Our school's NAPLAN results are once again outstanding, with the majority of our Year 7 and Year 9 students in the 'strong' or 'exceeding' bands for both Literacy and Numeracy. In almost every measure our school is achieving well above similar schools and is on par with or above, the state average.

#### PRINCIPAL





Our VCE results for this year are exceptional. Of the 54 students who sat the VCAA exams, eights students received an ATAR above 90 and another three over 80, which is remarkable. Of the 97 students completing Year 12 this year, 43 chose the VCE-VM or an Unscored pathway, a testament to the positive impact of the individualised Pathways Conversations, ensuring that these young people were empowered, informed and proactively chose a pathway into further study upon completion of this year. I think it is widely acknowledged, both at our school and across Victoria, that this cohort of Year 12 students are particularly special. They are focused on their learning, studious and perseverant; they are kind, respectful and caring of one another and towards the adults in their lives; they are optimistic and dream of achieving great things beyond school.

Stage 2 of the re-building of Reservoir High School has finally been completed with the state-of-the-art Science and Technology Centre and Canteen ready for the new school year and will provide our students with outstanding learning spaces as they engage in scientific inquiry and are immersed in technologically rich learning.

There have been so many extra-curricular opportunities for our students to explore their talents and passions. The Performing Arts Night and the Music Showcase were exceptional. The diversity of musical, dance and drama acts and genres ranged from a sophisticated version of Hitchcock's The 39 Steps, stunning classical pieces to highenergy rock music. All students performed with poise, confidence and skill. On both evenings the Theatre was filled with staff, students and families, all of whom were impressed by the quality of performances.

The production of 'Matilda' was a triumph. It was a privilege to watch our students perform live in the Theatre, showcasing the amazing talents and strengths of our students, who were dynamic, full of vitality and joy when performing. Our Federal Member of Parliament, Ged Kearney, joined me on the evening and we were blown away by the sheer talent and extraordinary performances executed by each cast member.

Just how exceptional our students are was further demonstrated in the outstanding results of our students in the NMR Athletics Competition, in what was a highly competitive field. Our Inter-School Debating Team competed in the final and were triumphant. Our senior Debating Team, consisting of three Year 11 students - Vivien Tang, Jake Proctor and Jake Chen- competed in the Grand Final in the Lions Club Interschool Debating Competition against Santa Maria College. It was a very close debate and our three students were highly articulate, confident and very persuasive.

Our four School Captains - Ainsley, Charlotte, Dylan and Vittoria, represented our school at the Northern Innovation and Sustainability Precinct Launch at La Trobe University. They starred in the project's film, which was introduced at the launch. The new Vice Chancellor of La Trobe University, Professor Theo Farrell, commented on how impressive our students were in showcasing what highly involved, intelligent and insightful young adults look like. Our students are truly remarkable.

A special event took place at the school in Term 4. The Premier of Victoria, the Honourable Jacinta Allen visited and met with a group of Year 9, 10, 11 and 12 students to discuss the new social media ban and seek input from our students. Premier Allan and Mr Lambert, MP held a roundtable with our students to discuss the changes to social media laws, both federally and from the Victorian Government. Our students were so very impressive in their level of insight, self-awareness and deep understanding of the negative impact social media has on our society and in particular, young people. I was equally impressed and in awe of the intelligent, articulate and knowledgeable young people whom we have the privilege of teaching.

There is no doubt that our students, whether they be academic, sporting or creative, are capable of remarkable things.

Thank you to our School Captains and all student leaders, including members of the Student Representative Council. You enrich the lives of us all through your dedication to amplifying the voices of all students and working alongside staff and the leadership team to make this school even better. Your work in revisioning the Student Leadership structure at the school from next year onwards has been exceptional and is a testament to your maturity, depth of knowledge and understanding of how to enact positive change in our school. I am so heartened to know that you are the changemakers of our future.



I would like to acknowledge the courage and commitment that this year's Year 12 students have demonstrated. We are very proud of what you have achieved, and I wish you all the luck in the world with your continuing learning and studies. Please do come back and visit at times, no matter where your paths may go. You will always remain a member of the Reservoir High School community.

I have felt deeply privileged to lead our school community this year and I am enormously proud of who we are and what we stand for at Reservoir High School. I am very much looking forward to returning next year with passion, energy and commitment.

Visual Art classes flourished this year, driven by creative risk-taking and exploration. Under the expert guidance of our dedicated Art teachers-Mr Langer, Ms Gomez, and Ms Sarroff-students engaged with a wide range of artistic mediums, including ceramics, mixed media sculpture, photography, digital art, drawing, collage, painting and digital software programs. This variety of materials and techniques encouraged students to develop their ideas, from initial concepts to polished works, fostering deep inquiry, critical thinking and creativity. Students explored diverse and meaningful themes, drawing inspiration from a broad spectrum of cultures and historical periods, to connect the past with the present. These efforts captured both personal insights and universal ideas. Beyond the classroom, Art Creative Practice students broadened their perspectives through excursions to galleries, museums, and Melbourne University's Victorian College of the Arts. These experiences deepened their understanding of both contemporary and traditional practices. Meanwhile, Mr Langer's Lunchtime Art Club provided a relaxed environment, where students could create, share and connect with their peers Our highlight of the year was the Arts and Technologies Exhibition, showcasing student achievements, along with engaging hands-on activities and the People's Choice Award. It was a wonderful opportunity to collaborate across the domains of STEAM, Design and Digital Technologies.

As the academic year concludes, we proudly recognise our students' outstanding achievements and their growth as creative thinkers and makers.
























































## DESIGN AND DIGITAL TECHNOLOGIES

Staff have created new units of work invented on the fly and students have adjusted admirably to all the changes. Year 8 Design Tech students have created recycled clocks and automata. 






















It has been another remarkable year in our STEAM program, with students showcasing creativity, problem-solving, and innovation through exciting hands-on projects. A key highlight was the Year 8 Sustainable Houses Project, where students designed and constructed small-scale models of sustainable homes. These models incorporated features like solar panels and energy-efficient designs, emphasizing critical thinking and practical skills, while preparing students to tackle real-world challenges in sustainability.

Our Year 7 classes explored engineering and urban design through engaging projects such as town mapping exercises. Part of the Year 8 course involved experimenting with bottle rockets, demonstrating a clear understanding of design principles and scientific inquiry. These activities not only inspired curiosity but also encouraged collaboration and teamwork.

Looking ahead, we are thrilled to announce the opening of our state-of-the-art STEM facilities in 2025. These purpose-built spaces will enable us to expand and refine our experiments, giving students access to cutting-edge technology and resources to further enhance their learning.

As we move forward, our STEM program remains committed to fostering innovation and sustainability. Next year promises exciting new challenges, pushing the boundaries of what our students can achieve in an ever-evolving world.























## SYSTEMS ENGINEERING

This year in VCE Systems Engineering, students worked on a range of hands-on projects that combined mechanical design, electronics and programming. We started with the mousetrap racer, where students learned about energy transfer and motion by designing and building a vehicle powered by a simple mousetrap. Next, we created cam toys, which helped students explore mechanical movement and develop their understanding of levers and linkages. Finally, we worked with Arduino microcontrollers, to bring coding and automation into our designs. Students used the Arduino to program circuits, adding interactive features to their projects. These activities allowed students to develop important skills such as problem-solving, critical thinking and teamwork, while also building their understanding of how engineering principles are applied in real-world contexts.

















# VISUAL COMMUNICATION DESIGN

Visual Communication Design is where creativity and practical problem-solving intersect. Offered to students from Years 9 to 12, the subject explores the core principles of design thinking: that thorough research and effective problem-solving underpin every successful design—whether it's architectural plans, branding campaigns, or illustrated children's books.

Our VCE students embraced diverse and challenging design briefs this year, exploring nano-housing solutions, fashion pop-up concepts, innovative packaging and more. Under the guidance of Mr. Langer, they navigated the complexities of the design process, mastering technical drawing techniques and addressing the constraints of materials and media—all while seeking to answer one essential question: What makes good design?

Mr. Langer fosters creativity and a strong sense of social responsibility in his design classes. He encourages students to push boundaries and always prioritise the needs of the people at the centre of their design solutions. This year, student projects catered to an array of audiences, including nature enthusiasts, individuals affected by the housing crisis, socially-conscious Gen Z fashionistas, club-goers, young readers, seafood consumers and more.

More than ever the world needs good designers to create innovative, thought-provoking and socially responsible solutions. Our students are rising to the challenge, proving that good design can create meaningful impact.
















































## **PRODUCTION**


Prestigious Dr. Stephen Livesey Scholarship

#### The 2/14 Battalion: A Legacy Carved in Stone

The z/t4th Battalion - Aussie history carved in stone.

They travelled far and wide, sacrificing all to guard our home.

Revered for courage at Kokoda, for hartles fought in New Guinea.

But to tell their story fully, we must return to the beginning—

To the formation of this mighty fighting force, where it all was forged,

At Puckapunyal's Army Base, where young and old stepped forward.

These were men from another age, from a time cut deep with pride, Men who, for their nation, put their very lives on the line. Men of honour, men of valour, with courage flowing in their veins, Whose deeds, eached in blood and stone, live on in history's page.

Through the jungles of New Guinea, they marched, unyielding, proud,
Through mud and sickness, through fever's grip, and in the shadowed shroud.
They answered a plea no one could ignore - a desperate, distant call,
To relieve the worn 39th Battalion and take up the fight as Australian's one and all.

The Japanese threat loomed close, and still the 39th held the line, Side by side with the 2/14th, brothers through dirt and grime. It was Lieutenant Colonel Ralph Honner, with steady hand and sight, Who declared they'd stand together, as Australians, one united light.

With the true spirit of Australia, they would leave no mate behind, Shoulder to shoulder, heart to heart, in duty firmly aligned. So it was here that they prepared to make their final stand, Fighting with honour, for friendship, for their beloved land.

The Japanese forces came relentless, a flood upon their shore, Men advancing like a storm, wave after wave in war. Yet the Diggers held their ground, through hardships fierce and unceasing, With hands and hearts as brothers, they stood - unbreakable, unyielding.

But such virtuous victories alas, were not to last forevermore For the Japs just had too many, and diggers started to fall Then Bruce Kingsbury rose, steadfast, his courage burning bright, With a Bren gan gripped tight, he charged into the fight.

"Follow me?" he called, his voice a torch to rally around,
His courage blazing flerce, defiant in each resounding sound.
Through hail of gunfire, he held the line, buying his mates precious time,
In an act of sacrifice, his heart both fierce and fine.





But as he reloaded his Bren, standing tall on a rock's crest, A sniper's bullet found him, putting his courage to eternal rest. His best mate, Alan Avery, carried him from that field of pain, An act of love and loyalty, of friendship's final claim

Such courage and such love to carry his body from the frontline Twas the truest act of friendship in the direct of times, For love of his brothers, for the cause they all held dear, His story is remembered, year after solemn year.

Who knows how many lives he saved, there was to many to count But he saved the day at Isurava, and there's not a single doubt Kingsbury was a hero, of that there's no debate, One whose bravery on that day forever changed his fate.

His nickname was "Steel," and I think it is clear why,
For this was no ordinary man of steel, this was superman in real life.
A hero in flesh, in heart, and in name,
His legacy lives on, a beacon, an undying flame.

Yet Kingsbury was not alone; many others stood that day, And it was not Steel's sacrifice alone, that kept the Japs at bay. Men like Corporal Charlie McCallum, who saved all his mates Firing Bren and Tommy gun at the Japs, until they all were safe

He was a woodchopper on Australian shores, a champion at that, Bren gun aimed at the enemy, Tommy gun on his shoulder strapped When Bren ran out, he swung Tommy forward spraying the enemy, And did so changing magazine, until everyone had reached safety

The Japs they came close, they tore his utility from his belt.

But he would live to fight another day, and buck into the jungle did they melt.

Recommended for a Victoria Cross just as Bruce Kingsbury.

For his courage unwavering and unmeasurable gallantry.

And then there was Lindsay Bear, whose heroics we'll never forget, Charging the lines with relentless courage, refusing any threat. Though wounded in leg and hand, he fought on all the same, A spirit defiant, a fire unbroken, in battle's heart aflame.

He lived on to serve in battles beyond, to defend and fight with pride, And we honour his name, his service, in solemn, lasting stride. For in war's harshest hours, when all hope seemed near lost, These men stood unbroken, accepting any cost.







Albert Neilson, George Pearce, Mocca Treacy, and Harold Wakefield too -Each name a symbol of courage, each heart loyal and true. They fought at Isurava, in a land far from their home, Sacrificing everything, in foreign fields to roam.

But what humbles us now, beyond their valour and might, Is how they sacrificed themselves, to protect our light. They gave of themselves, in hope we'd live free, To guard our lives, our homes, our every precious liberty.

How they gave up their futures, and put their lives on the line So that many years in future, I could peacefully live mine They choice to go into the army, this was no conscription see, And they volunteered still, when coming home was no guarantee


## Work Experienc
